THE HOLY SEASON OF ADVENT

What have I given to my Lord for all He has given to me?



Our desire for happiness cannot be satisfied in this life, and our inability to satisfy our desire for happiness is, in itself, a torment. It is a torment because, as it seems, every effort of ours towards happiness is perpetually frustrated. Pains of every sort surround us constantly, and they never allow us to be at peace, they never permit us to enjoy for long a state of contentment. When the woes of life – death, hurt feelings, sickness, loss of friends, poverty, defeat, and all the rest – press upon us we are keenly sensitive to the pain they cause. Our attention is wholly absorbed by this pain. When the death of a loved one strikes us, our conscious moments are filled with grief. When hurt feelings, sickness, loss of friends, poverty, and all the rest crash upon us, our minds can think of nothing else. Our attention is so totally absorbed by the pain that faces us, we are conscious of no other desire in our being save that of escaping the sufferings that plague us. In our analysis of the situations at hand, we come to the conclusion that we are the prey to misfortune and pain, and that our unwanted trials and tribulations are the sole obstacles to our well-being. We are of the belief that we were created for happiness. In truth we were created for happiness, but not the happiness that we seek after – the well-being that we would like to have in this present existence.

We fail to realize that even if we were to enjoy perfect health of body and mind, and if we were to escape the sorrows caused by separation and death; even were we to be exempt from the grief provoked by the sufferings of those dear to us; even if we were to live in that happy condition which should give us free scope to enjoy the pleasures of intellect and imagination - even were we to know no sorrow or pain or loss, and were we at the same time to be provided with all things - all the luxuries, all the conveniences, all the fun things, all the finest of foods, all the vacations our travel agents can present to us, all the trips on land or sea or air - all things which can minister to our physical and mental well-being, we would still be a prey to restless longings and unsatisfied cravings. The richest of people are amongst the saddest of people on earth: always on the search, and always disappointed! All those things that a man can possess may become his, but they cannot become himself - they are of man but they cannot be man. No matter how perfectly they may be possessed they will always remain external to him - they will always remain something that he will have to leave; they will always remain something that someone can take away from him. They will always be nothing more than what he can own, his property, but they cannot perfect him in himself! They will never fill that void that exists within himself. For, even though he may not realize it, it is his own perfection that man is always instinctively reaching out after in all his restless strivings - OR RATHER IT IS GOD, WHO ALONE CAN COMPLETE AND PERFECT MAN! We are unhappy because we are not perfect, and we are not perfect because we have not that fullness of existence for which we crave and for which we have the capacity. But money – all the money in the world – cannot purchase that fullness. Perfection means fullness of life, and fullness of life means complete happiness. Every natural thing – every living thing – reaches out after the possession and enjoyment of the fullest measure of existence of which it is capable. We, by our Baptism, are made participants in a higher than created nature. We, in a wonderful manner, are made sharers in a divine form of existence, and our hunger remains unsatisfied until union with that divine form is achieved. All the restless, feverish strivings after something, we know not what, that we experience constantly within ourselves, are provoked by the deep-seated fundamental realization of the emptiness of our being, its profound limitations, its terribly unfilled capacities, and its own utter insufficiency. No matter how hard we try; no matter how much money we spend; no matter how many trips we take to exotic places; the answer always remain the same: no rest! St. Augustine said: "My soul shall remain restless, until it rests in Thee, Oh Lord!"

- 8. Early Notice: Monday, December 24, 2007, is the Vigil of Christmas and is a day of fast and abstinence.
- 9. Early Notice: Miss Elizabeth Smith will carry the Baby Jesus and place Him in the Crib during the Christmas Eve Midnight Mass.
- 10. Early Notice: Tuesday, January 1, 2008 (New Years Day), is the Feast of the Circumcision of Our Lord and is a Holyday of Obligation. Masses in the Abbey Church on January 1, 2008, will be ONLY at 6:00 AM and 10:00 AM.
- 11. Please pray for all the Sick and Shut-ins of our Chapels. LET US ALSO PRAY FOR EVERYONE. Let us pray for ALL the priests and religious men and women of the world. NB: Anyone receiving Holy Communion at the Christmas Midnight Mass may NOT receive Holy Communion again at a later Mass on Christmas Day.


SPECIAL NOTE: There will be NO Confessions before the Midnight Mass or the 10:00 AM Mass on Christmas Day.
