"Conversio"

The word "conversion" is very often used rather casually to mean, as far as Catholics are concerned, the leaving of some separated religious sect and officially joining the Roman Catholic Church. Within the Church itself, conversion is not looked upon as involving a single declaration of faith or even Baptism. Still less is it looked upon as a mere statement of some meaningless, half-hearted resolution. Conversion does not mean joining up for a lifetime of lukewarm, haphazard, on again – off again, participation. The correct meaning of conversion – conversio – is a turning away from sin. True conversio is a life-long process of embracing Christ's doctrine in all its fullness and purity. The living of a life of conversio must be the essential effort of every true Christian. True conversio is, strictly speaking, a sincere repentance for past sins and a firm and serious purpose to correct one's way of living. It is not merely the changing of an attitude. Repentance – conversio – is an interior spiritual rebirth. It is not just sorrow for having offended God because of possible eternal punishment. It is a new way of living, with prayer being the stepping stone for overcoming the evil within.

Conversio means making our blessed religion real. It brings us to perfect sorrow for our past life of sin, with a solemn resolve not to live such a life any more. Conversio means fighting as hard as we can, with the help of God's grace, to submit our own will to Christ's will every day – no matter what. Conversio means the uninterrupted acceptance of and obedience to the Commandments of God and of the true and unadulterated teachings of the traditional Roman Catholic Church. Additions and subtractions of heretical teachings; pietistic observations of misguided souls; loosely applied weak and forgiving fatherimages of God; all such cannot in any way be tolerated. Conversio means a serious, firm, and dedicated interior purpose to correct one's self. Conversio means a profound and enduring change.
