(James 1, 23). Hence it is that the very best sermons are almost profitless when they are merely listened to and not pondered over.

In order to work upon the word of God a little quiet and calm is necessary; but frequently this is not given the faithful... Where will you find to-day in the home a person who tries to have a little quiet about him or within his own heart so as to meditate on the word of God and pray about it? Alas, "No man layeth it to heart" (Is. 57, 1). Nowadays we can scarcely put up with silence or solitude; and, as an unbelieving doctor once said, as soon as a man finds a little quiet, someone turns on the radio so that there will be at least some noise going on. We have forgotten the art of silence and recollection.

Even were we to find in the church the necessary atmosphere of calm, or could create it for ourselves in the home, we would be little served. We lack in great part the necessary means to assimilate the word of God, namely interior prayer. He who has no digestive organs cannot assimilate or get value from food even of the best quality. He who does not meditate derives little profit from even the best sermons. Only when we manage to pray inwardly may we hope for success from preaching. The listener must become a man of prayer again. The preacher must awaken in the listener the basic condition of a successful hearing of the word, inner prayer. Only he who knows how to pray understands how to recollect himself, how to assimilate what he has heard and make it his own.

St. Bernard loved God with all of his heart and mind and soul. St. Bernard's spirituality was kind, stern, strict, tough, strictly honest and to the point, and very solid. With unflinching uprightness, he held on to that love he had for God and because of that love, he withstood the fiercest attacks and deceitful schemes of the devil. He feared no man! The truthfulness of the untarnished love he had for God stood tall before everybody who looked at him. He never excused himself for his failings or weaknesses, and was always true to his calling as a monk. He never, EVER, had to walk in the shadows of life because of dishonesty or untruthfulness. He loved God, and the work of God, and went about doing that work. His name ranks high among the names of men. The strength of his work was strong enough to reconstruct the face of the Europe of his day. Let us pray strongly to this man, and ask him to help us all, especially in our effort to keep the beautiful, though flickering light, of our monastic endeavor from going out of existence, in these our tragic days.
