


The faithful who make the Heroic Act of Charity for the Poor Souls in Purgatory, may gain a PLENARY IN-DULGENCE, applicable only to the dead, on any day they (1) attend Mass, (2) receive Holy Communion, (3) pray for the intentions of the Sovereign Pontiff, and (4) make a good confession often.

## Heroic Act of Charity for the Poor Souls:

O my God, in union with the merits of Jesus and Mary, I offer Thee, for the Souls in Purgatory, all my propitiatory works, and all those which others may apply to me during my life or after my death. I beseech Thee, O my God, to accept this offering, for Thy honor and for the salvation of my soul. Amen.



November is the Month of the Poor Souls in Purgatory. Do not forget the Toties-quoties Indulgences (Toties-quoties means as many times as) for the Poor Souls. Each and every time a visit to a Church or Chapel is made during the period of time between 12:00 M today and 12:00AM tomorrow night and reciting the usual 5 Our Fathers and 5 Hail Marys and 5 Glory Be's with an added one of each for the required intention of the Church, one gains a plenary indulgence for the Poor Souls in Pugatory. Where it is impossible to enter a Church or Chapel, as it is for most of us today, one's Home Chapel can and should be used, repeating the same prayers as many times as you visit your little Chapel. Do this with right and safe conscience, and without fear leave the efficacy of it all in the Almighty Hands of our loving Father Who is in Heaven.

3. All Souls Day it is not a day of Obligation, nevertheless it is a day of greatest importance especially in charity for those Poor Souls who have no one to pray for them. Masses on Monday 6:00 AM and 8:00 AM there will be no Mass in the evening.

4. Thursday, November 5, 2009, is the First Thursday of November, with Holy Hour and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament in the Abbey Church from 10:00 AM to 11:00 AM and from 3:30 PM to 4:30 PM.

- 5. Friday, November 6, 2009, is the First Friday of November, with Masses in the Abbey Church at 6:00 AM and 8:00 AM. There is all-day Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament from 10:00 AM until 5:00 PM on that day.
- 6. Saturday November 7, 2009 is the First Saturday of November, with Masses in the Abbey Church at 6:00 AM and 8:00 AM.
- 7. Please pray for all the Sick and Shut-ins of our Chapels. LET US ALSO PRAY FOR EVERYONE. It is not for us to determine who to leave out of this prayer.



## THE POWER OF PRAYER

## FUNCTION OF PRAYER IN THE SPIRITUAL LIFE

It is much the same in the domain of the spirit. A man can work at high pressure if he is put to it; often indeed he can perform a good deal more than would have been deemed possible. But there is a limit to his reserves of strength; he cannot survive exclusively on mortification, self-denial, the cross. Absorption here provokes a more critical reaction; for suffering and the cross are not in accord with the natural man; rather they run counter to his inclinations, and exhaustion will more rapidly ensue. A point is reached when things come to a standstill, when, despite the best will in the world, we have to stop.

In the supernatural sphere, then, corresponding to relaxations in the natural domain like eating, drinking, sleeping, resting, a time comes when our energies have to be renewed and our spiritual vigour, used up in the practices of self-denial, has to be repaired. And here we have, as first and foremost means, the Blessed Eucharist which constitutes our most powerful source of strength and of grace. For it is the Author of grace himself who comes to us in His Human and Divine Nature to be the food for our journey. This sacrament is the chief source of strength, but it is not the first source; if it is to reanimate our flagging energies and produce fruit a hundredfold it needs to be based on a life of deep interior prayer. Prayer is the most important source of strength in the life of the Christian and indeed in the life of any worshipper of God, the reason being that it is the medium of all supernatural power. But only when prayer is experimentally appreciated as a source of strength will it be utilised to tap other sources of strength. Streams of life and power will then flow in upon us from every side, and our spiritual vigour never fails thereafter. Prayer is the quickener, the vivifying principle of the spiritual life; in its absence no interior life is possible. Let it become a living force within, then every faculty of the spiritual man palpitates with life.

Prayer, if not the greatest source of our strength, should at least be that most continuously employed. Should be, but in fact with many it has long ceased to be such; it rather results in dissipating our reserves in that its practice actually costs us at times a greater effort than applying ourselves to the heaviest type of work. And so we are easily inclined to put prayer as much as possible on the long finger, preferring hard work to it. And it is here, perhaps, that our spiritual life is most seriously impaired. What should impart vigour for a programme of self-sacrifice and dedication spells a loss of strength and costs us a greater effort than would the programme itself. No wonder then that slowly but surely our spiritual life declines. How could it be otherwise? One is eating into one's capital instead of living on one's interest; and capital, were it ever so substantial, is bound to diminish when it is being constantly used up and nothing is added to it.
