I wish to follow Thee as my Chief and that Thy Gospel may be my light and Thy Will my guide. Possess me wholly, through Thy Spirit, for the glory of the Father!

By this act of faith, we lay the very foundation of our spiritual life.

And if this act is frequently renewed, then Christ, as St. Paul says, "dwells in our hearts": that is to say He reigns in our souls in a constant manner as Master and King. and becomes in us. through His Spirit. the principle of divine life.
