

(20 + Gaspar + Melchior + Balthazar + 11) + + + <u>THE CEREMONY FOR THE BLESSING OF EPIPHANY CHALK</u> + + +

(Epiphany Chalk is used to write the inscription over all the doors of one's house. <u>Soft</u> classroom chalk of any color is best for writing on varnished or painted surfaces. A priest should bless the chalk on Epiphany Day, before the celebration of the main Mass of the day, using the following Blessing, which is taken from the Roman Ritual.)

- ℣. Behold, the Lord, the ruler is come; and the kingdom is in His hand, and power, and dominion. O God, with Your judgment endow the king, and with Your justice, the king's son.
- \emptyset . Glory be to the Father As it was in the beginning ... (Repeat the above: Behold, the Lord ...)
- \emptyset . Nations shall walk by Your light, and kings by Your shining radiance. . All nations shall serve Him.
- Ø. All from Saba shall come, bringing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the Lord. ₿. All nations...
- Ø. Rise up in splendor, O Jerusalem, for the glory of the Lord shines upon you. ℜ. All nations shall serve Him.
- i. The kings of Tharsis and the Isles shall offer gifts; the kings of Arabia and Saba shall bring tribute.

All kings shall pay Him homage; all nations shall serve Him. **R**. All nations shall serve Him.

Priest: LET US PRAY:

O Lord God, bless \bigstar this chalk which Thou hast created, that it may be helpful to mankind; and grant that through the invocation of Thy most holy Name all those who use this chalk or with it write over the doors of their houses the names of Thy Saints, Gaspar, Melchior, and Balthazar, may by their merits and intercession receive health of body and protection of soul. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen. (Priest now sprinkles chalk with Holy Water.)

(Later that day - or any day within the Octave of the Feast of the Epiphany - at home, the ceremony is completed by a priest or the father or senior member of the family. The following prayer is said once and at the main entrance of the house. All the family members should be present, and should accompany the priest or the head of the family as he or she goes from door to door - everyone keeping a respectful silence, or better yet, reciting the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary.)

Father: LET US PRAY:

O God, make the door of my house wide enough to receive all who need human love and companionship; narrow enough to shut out all envy, pride, and strife. Make its threshold smooth enough to be no stumbling block to children, nor to straying feet, but rugged and strong enough to turn back the tempter's power.

O God, make the door of my house the gateway to Thy eternal Kingdom. I ask these things in the Name of Jesus Christ Thy Son. *Amen.*

Some Hints for Religious:

Our divine Saviour has said: "The sabbath was made for man, not man for the sabbath" (Mark 2, 27). So too, rules and statutes are for man, not man for rules and statutes. The letter in many cases seems to be all that matters! In this connection, the Old Dispensation does not appear to have been superseded in all particulars and by all persons. "He (Christ) hath made us fit ministers of the new testament, not in the **letter** but in the **spirit**. For the letter killeth but the spirit quickeneth" (2 Cor. 3, 6). It may be that one or two of the group are unable of themselves to fill out the whole time allotted to prayer. But why, for the sake of these few, should the prayer of the others be disturbed? All can surely read to-day; if some fail to make headway with their meditation they can bring a book along and glean fresh thoughts from it. In case of need they can say their beads or make the Stations of the Cross in spirit. All unnecessary disturbance of the community should be avoided. Strict method is only a means; it may be dropped when the end in view can be reached without it. "I need not injure my teeth on the husk if I can reach to the core in some other way," says St John of the Cross.

This business of reading out and dividing up of points is, one might almost say, "a sin against the Holy Ghost"! The reason alleged for the practice, namely, it has always been done, does not hold. The contrary, indeed, is the case: in much earlier times it was not so. "Happy times of old that knew neither our methods nor our formulas," writes Bremond. "The word of God is not bound" (2 Tim. 2, 9). According to that principle "It was always so" a veto is put on a Protestant becoming a Catholic to-day. A Protestant once said to Count Friedrich von Spee who had entered the Catholic Church: "I cannot understand how a person can disown the faith of his fathers." "That is just it, replied von Spee: If my forbears had remained true to the faith of their fathers then I would not have to-day to be returning to the faith of my ancestors." "Our divine Lord has taught all how to pray and has made it a simple, direct and obvious practice. No imposing methods or systems are indicated. And he has promised that such simple, direct prayer will be fulfilled without 'ifs' and 'buts,' without restriction and without condition!"
