(2) At this blessed hour, the soul is given to Jesus as the BRIDE TO THE BRIDEGROOM; the mystical tomb wherein the soul is buried may be compared to the baptismal font wherein the neophyte was plunged. The Heavenly Father can say of this soul as of the newly baptised who has just PUT ON CHRIST: "This is My Beloved Child in whom I am well pleased!" What bounty is lavished upon this soul while God so lovingly beholds in it His Son!
