A Priest

THE VOCATION OF THE PRIEST IS PRAYER. In every true priest, there is a huge power - a power beyond his comprehension, for the power of the priest is Christ - Who makes his prayer stronger than thunder, and more lovely and gentle than the Spring breezes. Since Jesus is the center of the soul of every true and good priest, the priest has the strength to shake the very foundation of the universe. Jesus it is Who lifts up the priest together with the Sacred Host, and the altar, the sanctuary, the people, the church, the monastery, the convent, the cities, the continents, the world, indeed all things. It is Jesus Who places everything that exists in the Hands of the Eternal Father. Therefore, the priests lives to utter the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass which is the highest of all prayers. Every Mass that a priest offers up to God is a solemn petition that every man on earth might come to be moved to answer the call of Charity. When he speaks for the people he is in the best position to speak to God - it is the priest who unites men to God. His personal holiness will indeed serve him quite well at such times. The priest lives to utter the Mass which is above and beyond any career achievement that has ever been known to man.

In his effort to spiritualize the world, the priest raises his consecrated hands and the Grace of Christ's resurrection goes out from him to enlighten the souls of the elect and of them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death. Through his blessing, material creation is raised up and sanctified and dedicated to the Glory of God. Through the priest, the glory of Ghrist seeps out into creation until all things are saturated in prayer, and the wine turned Blood is the only substance on this entire globe that can cleanse man of his imperfections and gloom.

The priest has the whole church on his conscience and he not only gives up his own will in order to possess the virtue of obedience, he gives up his own will in order to become an instrument for the salvation of the world and the pure Glory of God!
