Once again we begin to speak of ADVENT - the wonderful Season of Advent. Plans must be made, and things must be done. Advent is the time of preparation for the coming great celebration of Christmas. But the real sweetness of Christmas has all but been forgotten, and the mad rush of the present day living which we now consider Christmas has set in. To a certain extent, every one of us has been caught up in the rush of the season and have become addicted to it.

Christmas is central to us as Catholics. Our holy religion begins there. Advent takes us back to the early ages, and it leads us through those periods of serious expectation and back to the early ages, and it leads us through those periods of serious expectation and waiting and hoping. Advent, then, is a wonderful time for teaching our little children of the things of God. Much depends on the way we use Advent as a teaching "instrument". The good or the bad impression we give our children, will determine their attitude toward this holy Season for the remainder of their lives. Advent can be a period of joy and warmth, a grand and awaited for time each year in the lives of our children - even though penetential. It all goes together. It can also be made to be a time of chill and bleakness and gloom and penance, a dreaded time each year in the lives of our children. The elder members of the family must try to remember that the lovely little children will not always be little, easy to manage children, forever. They will grow up, and the good or the bad that we show them in their innocent childforever. They will grow up, and the good or the bad that we show them in their innocent childhood will remain with them throughout their lives. If we show them love and joy and teach them how to use all the normal things of real life in wholesome and religious ways, -WITHOUT FORCE - that is what they will likely follow when they reach adulthood. If our behaviour is peculiar, full of eccentricity, and if we treat the normal things of real life in some abnormal and odd way, our children will find it distasteful in later life to combine good, fun things with any religious significance. They will quickly join the madness of it all! We are Catholic, and the Catholic life - - (THE SENSUS CATHOLICUS) - - is anything but eccentric and abnormal. Catholic life has always looked at all things with prudence and common sense.

ion is filled with prudent and wise teachings concerning work, recreation and PRAYER.

Many truly wonderful customs were introduced into Catholic Family life from the pagan world. This was done simply by changing the pagan point of view to a sound Catholic point of view, while allowing the activity in question to remain unchanged. The Catholic way of life has always tried to blend the seriousness of religion with home enjoyments of various festivals, and the end result is always beautiful. For the last three or so hundred hears, a puritanical and jansenistic false zeal had blotted out many wonderful and proper customs, once enjoyed by many good family circles. Sad to say, Jansenism is enjoying a rebirth in some of our traditionalist areas, and this is bad, and will have detrimental effects on our children. But these detrimental effects will not become visible until later on in their lives when they begin to show hatred and contempt and distaste for all religious custom, and Catholic living. This is already in evidence when we view a goodly number of our late teen-age young adults who came from "strict"

traditionalist families.

The Christmas Season is an important season, and it cannot be by-passed - no matter how we try to by-pass it. The rages of consumerism are everywhere, and our little children quickly begin to feel the attractiveness of it all, no matter how "sinful" we tell them that it is.

The confusion in their little minds will remain with them.

A proper use of Advent, as a truly religious experience as well as a time of preparation for a really great and joyous event, is what we must strive to bring together. Christmas - and Santa Claus with it - must be presented to our children in a good and common sense way. Our aim must be to teach our children the truly Catholic Christmas Vision - of Christmas and of Santa Claus - the two go together - and then they will come to know that on a high level of our love for the Tiny Baby Jesus, a true and genuine Catholic will find CHRIST-MASS and Santa to be quite compatible with each other, and Santa Claus does come down the chimney with his sack full of gifts, and he only travels on Christmas Day, and Santa Claus has his best gift for the Baby Jesus. To do this in any other way is unwise. When things are force moved out of context with reality, they lose meaning, and soon become distorted. The Church has always struggled to superimpose a religious significance on the actual reality of the moment. With ness the feast of Christmas itself when the Birth of Jesus Christ was taken together and at the same time as the celebration of the most pagan moment of the year - DECEMBER 25 -Saturnalia!!!!. The Church has always known the better way of doing things.
