About Humility

We should constantly ask God to enlighten us on our need of the virtue of humility, and beg Him to give us an increase of it and to give us a good understanding of just exactly what humility really is. We must avoid the use of formulas and resolutions in our effort to acquire humility. One does not press a button, and humility (virtue) IMMEDIATELY appears in full force. A great SINCERITY IS NEEDED in the use of words that spell our the "how" to become humble. Also, there must be a full and generous co-operation with grace, by accepting all the humiliations that come to us. It is a vain and useless waste of good time if we read volumes about virtue and do not have a firm purpose in mind to do something about the acquiring of it. The time spent in reading is quite useless if we fail to profit and one of the property and practices like these wastelly are by it and SEE a change taking place within us. Prayers and practices like these usually are a meaningless substitute for the practice of solid virtue. When using them we must try and develop at the same time the "UNPROFITABLE-SERVANT" attitude. If meditation on the greatness and perfections of God is the principal means of progress in humility, it may be asked: is it wrong to seek after self-knowledge? Should we make no effort to come to know ourselves? To think so would be a mistake. What we must avoid is a too self-conscious turning in on our selves; a FOCUSING in on our selves; a too much concentration on our defects and weaknesses such as would not lead us to holiness. Studied and analylitical thinking about onself is to be very much discouraged, and will not help at all. God is the only worthy object of our contemplation, and we ourselves are not worth thinking about. The time we spend thinking about ourselves is time taken away from the thought of God! When once we give our best thoughts to God and His greatness, we will bring everything else





LIVING WITH THE MILLENNIUM BUG:

Are You Ready for the Coming Computer Crisis?

On January 1, 2000, many computers will stop working properly, severely disrupting our society and affecting all of us, a problem in computer programming involving a simple two-digit error may turn our world upside down. In a worst-case scenario, electric power will be lost, telephones won't work, food will be scarce, airplanes will be grounded, businesses will go bankrupt, banks will close, and society will be in chaos. Even if this scenario is too pessimistic, major changes are coming--and it's important to be prepared.

Early computer programmers, to save computer memory space, expressed years in two-digit form (73 for 1973, 82 for 1982, etc.). A problem now exists because computers whose programs haven't been updated (an expensive, time-consuming task) will read 00 as 1900, not 2000. This will cause them either to reject legitimate entries, to compute erroneous results, or simply to stop running. Our modern society is completely dependent on computers, especially in the fields of banking and finance, industry, communications, energy, transportation, shipping, retail sales, insurance, and government; without reliable computers, many companies and institutions will find it very difficult—if not impossible—to continue functioning. That's why businesses and the government are spending billions of dollars in a desperate effort to update all their computer programs to eliminate the "Millennium Bug"—but these efforts may have started too late; many experts believe there isn't enough time to prevent serious problems that will affect, to one degree or another, every American. (For instance, a 1997 survey of computer experts asked them to rate the likely results of the coming crisis on a scale of 1 - 5, with 1 representing only minor problems, 3 representing serious economic disruptions, and 5 representing a complete collapse of the economy. The average rating was 3.96.)

There are certain steps you can take to protect yourself and your family from the coming Millennium Bug, being prepared will make it easier to cope with possible disruptions to our American way of life. It's important to do something, and to begin soon; after New Year's Day of 1999, we have less than 365 days to prepare for the year 2000.

Recommendations

1. Become informed on the issue. A recommended book is *The Millennium Bug*, by Michael S. Hyatt. (Call Regnery Publishing toll-free at 1-888-219-4747 for ordering information.) If you're online or have access to the Internet, log onto www.catholic2000.com (a website giving much useful information on the coming crisis from a Catholic perspective).

2. Obtain written copies of all important documents (birth certificates, marriage licenses, deeds, titles, mortgages, loan statements, bank balances, credit card statements, tax returns, etc.); records

stored only in computers or on computer discs may become inaccessible.

Store food and water. If computers aren't functioning, food might not be shipped to markets (due to difficulties in scheduling and routing trucks and trains), and water might be unavailable (due to a lack of electric power to operate the pumping stations). The time to stockpile what you'll need is before the crisis hits. Begin storing dried, packaged, and canned foods with a long shelf life, along with canned juices, soft drinks, and other forms of liquid. Rinse and sterilize empty jars and plastic pop bottles, and then fill them with water. Remember: if a crisis occurs, these and other essential items will disappear, or be available only at exorbitant prices (and even if a crisis doesn't take place, you'll still be able to use the items you've stored).

Stockpile common household goods, including such things as candles, matches, cigarette lighters, lighter fluid and charcoal (in case a barbecue grill is necessary for cooking), flashlights, batteries, toilet paper, paper towels, toothpaste, soap, disinfectant, first-aid supplies, non-presciption drugs and medicines, etc. Not only will likely you need such things, but if the currency collapses (an outside possibility), we'll return to a barter economy--and you'll have practical, worthwhile items to trade

for needed goods and services.

Make sure you have enough warm clothing and bedding. If the utility companies go off line on 5. January 1, 2000 (a 40% chance, according to a federal government report), you'll need to dress very warmly. Have good, heavy sleeping bags available. Also, have an extra supply of underwear and socks (for if water is rationed, you won't be able to do laundry very often).

Arrange for an alternate source of heat and light. This might mean a fireplace or wood-burning stove (along with enough firewood), or even a gas-powered generator or camp stove (with sufficient fuel). Candles, matches, and oil lamps may also be helpful. Make sure your home is well-insulated.

Have any needed medical or dental work, and any elective surgery, completed in 1999. If electric power is lost due to the Millennium Bug, it may be weeks or months before it's restored-and hospitals and dental offices will have difficulty functioning during this period.

Don't stray far from home on New Year's Eve 1999. Cars will still work when the Millennium Bug strikes, but traffic lights and street lights may go out. In particular, don't rely on the airlines to get you home (especially from overseas), as the FAA's air traffic control computers likely won't be ready, forcing a drastic reduction in the number of flights that can be safely operated and controlled.

Be prepared for a possible run on the banks. Even though banks are better prepared for the Millennium Bug than most other institutions, they're highly susceptible to public perceptions of a crisis. Have sufficient cash (or goods available for bartering, as in #4 above) on hand for your needs. If possible, consider purchasing gold or silver (in case paper money becomes worthless).

Have a good set of tools available, along with materials for home repairs (nails, lumber, window panes, heavy plastic) and "how to" books that will help you perform any needed fixing of your home.

Make sure your home is secure; replace any weak or broken locks on doors and windows. (A 11. severe economic disruption may lead to an increase in burglary and vandalism.)

Don't panic, but also don't ignore the problem. As more and more people will come to realize, the implications of the Millennium Bug are real and serious--but our country has survived worse crises than this. The time to start preparing is now (since needed supplies will only become harder to find and more expensive as 2000 draws closer). Even if it isn't possible to do everything on this list, it's important to do something (as minimal preparation is better than no preparation at all). However, it's essential to maintain a trusting and generous spirit. God will give us our daily bread (as long as we share what we have with those in need).
