We admire the things we possess and we love them greatly and oftentimes we place our trust in them as being our support. When we glance upon our wonderful possessions, a sense of well-being comes upon us, and our chests fill up with pride: it all feels so good! We are overtaken by a feeling of accomplishement, a feeling of achievement, so much so that we, without really intending it, take God for granted.
