LENT

Today is Lætare Sunday. The altar is clothed in rose-colored drapes, with flowers adding to the holy joy of the occasion. The priest also is vested in rose-colored vestments. Lent is half over, and the mood today is that of quiet rejoicing. However, from this moment on, the mood of Lent changes and we quickly come into contact with the intense seriousness and somberness of the horror in store for our beloved Lord and Savior.
