

When we pray for others, the voice of our prayer reverberates through the immensity of God to the minds and hearts of all mankind, and in virtue of the divine immensity resounds with a sympathetic resonance in the hearts of all who daily receive their supernatural guidance from their Eternal Father. When we pray for others we should think particularly of those who know Him not, who persecute Him, and who harbor mischief in their hearts and minds, and we should beg that they may be converted and turn to God - their salvation. And in virtue of the divine immensity what we say in our own hearts reverberates in the minds and hearts and religious convictions of those in distant lands; and then in strange and unexpected ways those who have never known Him begin to understand that it is He Who is their God - their Savior and consolation. As we pray for others we should pray also most warmly for those of our own household and for those whose voices, like ours, are being lifted up to Him Who is the Father of us all.

SANCTITY TODAY AND EVERYDAY

EXCEPTIONAL TIMES DEMAND EXCEPTIONAL CONDUCT. The wave of evil today can only be turned back by a counter-wave of holiness. But holiness today is looked upon, in general, as a mental disorder rather than the practice of virtue. Nevertheless, every living person is called upon to participate in this counter-wave and in the work of expiation and reparation. Truly speaking, the situation is so critical that no one has a right to be mediocre. We cannot be satisfied with being half a saint. We must be a whole saint or no saint at all. "The lukewarm and the indifferent I shalt vomit out of My mouth."

As each sin compromises the salvation of the world, so does each good action performed as an act of expiation and reparation help some poor - unknown - sinner to salvation. If men only knew what awaits them in eternity, they would do everything in their power to change their lives and bring themselves more closely in conformity to the wishes of the eternal God. But what exactly is it that God wishes of those who work to bring their lives into conformity with His expectation? Can the demands of God be met by mortal man? Is it possible for the work of finite man to be satisfactory to an infinite God? The truth of the matter is that what God asks of any of us is so simple and so very reachable. The penance, the expiation, the reparation that God asks of each of us is simply to persevere in doing His Will in all things, which means the keeping of His Commandments and accepting all the sufferings and difficulties encountered in the vicissitudes of everyday living with patient and prayerful resignation.

Unfortunately, many people imagine that penitence means the practice of great austerities, painful fasts, tedious prayers, torturous hair shirts, and all the rest. The result of this mistaken and uncalled-for practice, which is usually constructed around personal preference, disordered conventions, and improper religious formation, is that inevitably since most people have neither the strength nor the generosity to undertake such austerities perseveringly for great lengths of time, they become discouraged and even disillusioned when things fail to meet their personal expectations, and they literally give up and then fall, sooner or later, into a life of indifference and sin.

If we but look at the matter squarely and work to exercise the virtue of prudence; if we but take the time to study and imitate the life of Christ; if we but make the trip to the House of Nazareth and enter into that life; we will soon learn that all that God asks of any of His children is to offer up as penance and prayer the sacrifices necessary to avoid sin, however difficult such an avoidance may be in our present pagan environment. God simply, mercifully, and lovingly asks that we strive to maintain unswerving fidelity to our reasonable religious obligations; that we perform our daily tasks to the best of our abilities; that we strive to be honest, patient, and charitable; that we keep constant guard against temptation; that with the free exercise of love, we love Him with our hole heart and mind and soul and being. Is He asking for too much? Is His demand beyond human strength?

However, besides the living out of such unspectacular requests, there is a bit more that should be done by those who claim to love God: there is the quiet but effective and greatly meritorious routine of patiently bearing the various unavoidable and inevitable crosses present in everyday life: pain, sickness, weariness, humiliation, disappointment, frustration, tension, anxiety, fear, disagreement, misunderstanding, and all the rest. Even the weather can be a source of worry, concern, and discomfort. All these and countless others can be turned into prayerful advantages, simply by offering them to God. It is all a matter if disposition and intention. An improper attitude - a grumbling disposition - can make of these a total waste, reducing them to the ashes of uselessness, whereas a simple turning around of our intention and disposition quickly makes of these moments works of the greatest value, which serve for the betterment of all mankind and at the same time increases our own sanctity.
