  3. Thursday, September 8, 2005, is the wonderful Feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This is surely a most important feast, especially now that more oppression has entered into the lives of us all. Now has the time arrived for us to pray with greater fervor and trust, to prepare with wisdom and prudence, to prepare to accept with patience and common sense the curtailments that have begun to enter into our daily lives.
  4. **NO** Vespers and Benediction today.
  5. Let us offer up special prayers and sacrifices for all the millions of people suffering from the ravages of Hurricane Katrina, especially in Louisiana and Mississippi. These poor people are suffering unbelievable horrors and hardships, as well as the deprivation of even the bare necessities of life. Let us not say: "Well, God is punishing them because they deserve it!" NO! **WE** are suffering from the results of our own pride and stupidity, especially in throwing God out of our lives and insisting that mankind can take care of itself.
  6. We take the current chain of events to re-emphasize the importance of our Home Chapels. These little chapels will quickly become a strong and unbreakable link to our Most Holy Faith. We strongly advocate that these chapels be in regular use on a daily basis, and that each evening, the father of the family gather together his family at the chapel, say the Rosary (which should never be omitted) and regular prayers, and finally place his paternal blessing on his family. In the absence of the father, the mother assumes this responsibility. If we claim to be true and staunch keepers of the True Faith of the True Church of Jesus Christ, then we are obliged to take whatever steps are necessary to maintain that Faith within our own households. This is most urgent! These little chapels will show their utter importance at such times when attendance at regular Sunday Mass is impossible.
  7. Please pray for all the Sick and Shut-ins of our Chapels. LET US ALSO PRAY FOR EVERYONE. Let us pray for ALL the priests and religious men and women of the world. NO MAN, WOMAN, OR CHILD SHOULD BE LEFT OUT OF OUR PRAYER. God made all men to be with Him in heaven for all eternity, and this includes every human being on earth, regardless of station or condition or place. While Our Blessed Lord was hanging on the Cross He did not look around and pick and choose those for whom He was dying. He did not exclude a single member of the Human Race – even His enemies – from the wounded Love that came forth from Him during those momentous moments. Weak human nature and erroneous persuasions will prevent some from achieving the purpose intended for them by God, but that matter remains entirely between all such and God. Our only duty is to pray for **souls**. We make **no** judgments concerning such matters. If there is any sifting to be done, it is to be done by God, Himself alone. We are **NOT** the ones to do the sifting.
