Feast of the Immaculate Conception

Thursday, December 8, 2005

- (The statue of Our Lady on page one stands over the High Altar of our Abbey Church.)
- There will be NO Catechism class this morning.
- There will be NO 5:00 Sunday Vespers and NO Benediction this afternoon.
- Tuesday, December 6, 2005, is the wonderful Feast of Saint Nicolas. Please read the instruction given on the next page. The troubled times of today, much more than the troubled times of yesteryear, demand a very keen understanding and application of these suggestions. At the same time they demand a prudent, wise, and unmistakably Catholic observance.
- Wednesday, December 7, 2005, is the Vigil of the Immaculate Conception and is a day of fast and abstinence. 5.
- Thursday, December 8, 2005, is the Feast of the Immaculate Conception and is a Holyday of Obligation, with Masses in the Abbey Church at 6:00 AM, 8:00 AM, and 7:00 PM.
- Wednesday, December 14, Friday, December 16, and Saturday, December 17, 2005, are the Winter Ember Days of the year, and are days of Fast and Abstinence. Meat may be eaten ONCE on Wednesday and Saturday.
- NB: Christmas Eve Saturday, December 24, 2005 is a day of Fast and Abstinence. In every normal interpretation, Christmas Eve is a day of COMPLETE FAST AND ABSTINENCE. At the same time, Christmas Eve has to be understood to be a festive day of penance. Festivity simply cannot be suppressed or avoided on such a day - the eve of such a wondrous occasion. Therefore, a bit of "shortcutting" in the law of fast and abstinence on that day is certainly understandable. In this matter, as in all similar matters of moral obligation, prudence, prompted by a good, sincere, and properly informed conscience, should dictate. Too much to the right is just as bad as too much to the left - IN THE MIDDLE IS VIRTUE! Our service to God depends on our FREEDOM OF ACTION, inspired by love - it must never be pushed by force. At the same time, our freedom must be kept within the limits of proper Traditional Catholic understanding and observance.
- Be mindful of the Novena in progress in Honor of the Blessed Mother, and place before her the critical needs of each and every one of us.
- 10. Let us also be quite mindful that we are in the very important Season of Advent. In so doing, let us recall the prayers of the priest during Mass: "What have I given to my God for all He has given to me?" God's gifts to us are obvious and need no enumeration. How strong is the motivating force of self-interest in the giving of ourselves to Him? Our commitment to God must be self-effacing, firm, and definite. It must always be generous and the result of our love for Him working with His grace operating within our hearts and souls.

<u>Christmas Mass at St. Pius V Chapel</u> in Birmingham will be at 9:00 AM on Christmas Day.



Tuesday, December 6, 2005, is the Feast of Saint Nicholas, Bishop of Myra in Asia Minor. He was and continues to be a beloved Saint – especially of children. In many parts of the world, St. Nicholas would visit with little children on the evening before and then leave little goodies for them. These little visits are no longer possible, so now he passes quietly through the houses of each good child, filling a shoe or little basket with goodies. He was a wonderful Saint who loved to do good things, and everywhere he visited, he left people feeling happy and full of joy, and eagerly waiting for his visit next year. In the meantime, the children would try hard to behave properly in honor of good St. Nicholas. Later in life, when the little ones find out that St. Nicholas is an older member of the family, the knowledge does not cause any harm to them. The thrill of this beautiful childhood custom is retained in the memory, remaining to the days of old age – in all its beauty and fantasy. The older folks enjoy St. Nicholas Day as much as the children, and a little party on this day is a wonderful custom to foster.

Beginning on December 17, at Vespers of each day, the Church Liturgy introduces what are called the "O" Antiphons. These are beautiful prayers sung in Choir by the monks in a very splendid and solemn manner and tone. These antiphons, which are scriptural texts a few lines long, are so many jewels of inspired poetry. Each prayers ends on the eager cry – "Come"! There is a climactic order in these antiphons. In the first, O Sapentia (O Wisdom), we take a backward flight into the recesses of eternity to address Wisdom, the Word of God. In the Second, O Adonai (O Lord of Lords), we have leaped from eternity to the time of Moses and the Law of Moses (about 1400 BC). In the third, O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), we have come to the time when God was preparing the line of David (about 1100 BC). In the fourth, O Clacis David (O Key of David), we have come to the year 1000 BC (the beginning of the final Millennium before the birth of the Lord). In the fifth, O Oriens (O Rising Dawn), we see that the line of David is elevated so that the people may look upon a rising star in the east, and hence in the sixth, O Rex Gentium (O King of Nations), we know that He is King of all the world of man. This brings us to the evening before the Vigil of Christmas (December 23), and before coming to the town limits of Bethlehem, we salute Him with the last great "O" and we sing O Emmanuel (O God with Us).

Each evening at Vespers time (around 5:15 PM) the family should gather around their home altar for the recitation of the Rosary. When the Rosary is finished, one of the great "O" Antiphons should be recited as a solemn prayer. Special emphasis should be placed on the words at the end when we cry out to God in our needs and expectations. These are prayers of the highest level, and should be prayed with great solemnity and seriousness.

Are not our own days filled with anxiety, worry, concern, and expectation? Many indeed are the reasons for concern, but we must never lose hope. We too cry out "O Emmanuel!" and in accordance to the strength of our faith shall we be heard.
