that which has spiritual importance. It is hopeful that whatever we learn during the Season of Lent will linger on after the Season is over. During Lent we should strive after being mortified; being penitential; being recollected. Individual

mortification or penance or whatever has much less value than a mortified or penitential attitude of mind giving a subconscious response to whatever unexpected problem happens across the path of our daily life. Individual acts of mortification, additional prayers, increased acts of penance, and all such like, are oftentimes tarnished with pride, especially as we look about us and notice that those around us are not so diligent as we are. The

acts of mortification or penance or reparation or anything else are not good enough. Any planned or predetermined act of

temptation that follows places us a cut above those around us who are not as diligent in the keeping of Lent as we are, and thus the labor we have performed gains no merit for us, rather, the pride involved injures the quality of our offering. Whatever we do, if it is to be offered as a sacrifice pleasing to God, it must be personal, private, spiritual, humble, honest, and serious. After that, we must strive to understand our neighbor's interior workings and then not place judgment upon him.
