## "This day you shall see His Glory"

Two thousand years ago there came into this world a Man whose Life of thirty-three years is the chief event in the world's history. Indeed, it was and is the chief and most important event in the history here and hereafter of every one of us all.

In His coming He gave to all mankind all that had been lost by the Fall of Adam and Eve. He gave us much more: He gave us Himself. Since His coming we no longer think of Him as far away in Heaven where we can hardly reach Him even by thought, but as one of ourselves. We see Him as one Who can be seen, as one Who can be heard, as One Who can be handled. We see Him as a Man with a country and Who lived in a family, with ancestors, good and bad, with a Mother and with a home. We see Him as a Man with friends and enemies, as a Man with a certain character and ways, as a Man with likes and dislikes. We see Him as a Man with sorrows and with joys. How wonderful for us, for we can see Him as our God, the God whom we adore and love.

He was promised four thousand years before He came into this world. The race, the tribe, the family, the time of His coming, the chief events of His life were all known. So much so were all these things known, that in the reign of the Emperor, Augustus Caesar, when the time foretold by the prophets had come, there was a widespread expectation of a great Deliverer, and many eyes were turned to the little country of Palestine where He was to appear. And there, in Bethlehem, in a tiny wind-blown shelter for animals – the ONLY place on this entire earth appropriate for the birth of the Lord, God Himself – on a cold winter's night, He came! Angels sang in the heavens and extended special invitation to the most unlikely first visitors of the Divine King: shepherds sitting on a hillside tending their sheep.

Is this not a marvel to outdo all marvels? Everything was appropriate and appropriately done for the One Whose Life was the chief event in the entire world's history! Later, a star shining out in the eastern sky brought wise men from great distances to adore at His feet. Then, suddenly all the marvels around Him ceased, He had to go into hiding in a land far distant – Egypt. While men were still expecting and wondering why the Promised One delayed so long, He was growing up from youth to manhood, and working at a carpenter's trade with His foster Father, Joseph, in a tiny shop in the despised village of Nazareth. We have not seen Him exactly as the people of His day saw Him live out His every day life, but we have the story of His Life written by those who knew Him well. These are days in which our belief in Jesus Christ must be firmly rooted if it is to remain unshaken by the unbelief and the indifference and the forgetfulness and the hatred all around. We must work without ceasing to bring home to ourselves in every possible way known to us the truth about Him – Who He is, What He is, what He came into this world to do.
